1.Introductions/Announcements:

- Marcy (CEDO): PIT Count is January 24th. It will be run in conjunction with the Here to Help Clinic
- Megan (ICA): Update on the Annual Homeless Assessment Report. 3 reports (PSH-family, PSH-individual, and Transitional Housing-individual) were accepted. Previous years, none have been accepted. This report ties into HMIS data reports.
- 211- VT Coalition to End Homelessness is hiring. Texting 211 is now available. Handout #5 provided
- Committee updates and other updates:
 - Coordinated Entry: final stages of release for HMIS, exploring the combination of Housing Resource Team and Case Manager tables, next meeting Jan 25th @ 8:30 @CHT
 - COC awarded all requests except bonus project. Split projects from around the country were not funded; ours was. VT ranks #7 in the nation for kept/increased projects.

2.Roadmap to End Homelessness Update (Margaret Bozik, CHT)

- The report is now complete and submitted to the Legislature; full report was sent to the Continuum email group
- Info in the report around cost avoidance and need to make ending homelessness a reality.
- Really highlights the need for individual households than family households; this was shown to be a statewide need, not just Chittenden County.
- The data does not include information around hotel stays.
- This topic will be put back on a future agenda to talk more in depth about the results and limits to the study

3. Housing Research Project (Alexa Collesides, AmeriCorp Vista/AHS)

- 3 Vista volunteers to work with AHS around collecting data.
- They are looking to collaborate with service providers to collect data.
- Month long study looking at individuals that are newly homeless and are considered to be experiencing literal homelessness and/or the precariously housed
- Interested in looking at services, cost of delivering services, and what services might be helpful in the future for folks that are presenting similarly to individuals in the project

4. Point in Time Count (Marcy Esbjerg, CEDO—see attachment #1)

- Count will be taking place the January 24-25
- The final form will be sent electronically, with some areas pre-populated for specific service areas
- Form can be completed online
- Fill the forms out completely; if the form is incomplete, Marcy will follow up looking for additional information. Inaccuracies on a form can result in the form not being useable for data collect.
- Precariously housed individuals are not counted as it has to meet the HUD definition of literally homeless
- Directions on how to fill the form out correctly are on the back of the form.
- Training webinar is on Jan 12th @ 10am. It is recommended that new employees take the webinar
- Biggest change: expanded outreach efforts through Chittenden County Regional Planning. Letter was sent out to other town officials and providers in Chittenden County.

7. Warming Shelter and Extreme Cold Weather Exception Update (Marcy Esbjerg, CEDO, Jane Helmstetter, AHS, and Geoffrey Pippenger, DCF/ESD—see attachment #4)

- Extreme Cold Weather Exception pop up shelters are now in effect; this is another safety net but not the same as the general Cold Weather Exception
- Decision to move forward with protocol is made by DCF Commissioner and Secretary of AHS
- -25 degrees triggers the conversations (it is not an automatic process) between above named parties
- United Methodist Church will be the location in Chittenden County, staffed by volunteers, coordinated by CVOEO
- Warming Shelter: sentiment shared that it is going well, cut back on security as the feeling is that it is not needed, 69-70 unique individuals, make-up of age groups varies, conversations have started around a year round, low barrier shelter

8. Quarterly Meeting (Jane Helmstetter, AHS)

- Results of funding collaborative will be presented
- Conversations with individuals who have lived experience will continue
- Feb 13th @ Bobbin Mill (if available)

9. Communication (Stephen Marshall, Homeless Advocate)

- Problem identified with the consistent delivery of food for our homeless neighbors over the holidays. No breakfast or dinner was provided over the holiday weekend in December. Nothing was open on Christmas Day so 75+ people were at the Day Station. Better coordination of meal providers needs to happen. Conversation needs to happen around food security.
- Homeless neighbors felt that the current Warming Shelter refers too much to COTS policy. General impression was that this year's Warming Shelter is different than last (since the agency running the shelter is different) so the policies should reflect that.

Youth Homelessness Joint Committee Proposal Chittenden Continuum of Care and Balance of State Continuum of Care Vermont Coalition to End Homelessness, December 2016

Point of Contact: Bethany Pombar, Director, Vermont Coalition of Runaway and Homeless Youth Programs

Proposal: As the Vermont Coalition to End Homelessness (VCEH) and the Chittenden Homeless Alliance (CHA) work to advance local and national goals of ending homelessness by 2020, we recognize that youth under 25 represent a unique population impacted by experiences of homelessness. Factors that contribute to youth homelessness include family problems, economic circumstances, class and racial disparities, mental health and substance abuse issues, and involvement with public systems. Responses to preventing and ending youth homelessness require a range of interventions that meet youth's unique developmental and social needs.

To address the unique needs of this community, we convene the Youth Homelessness Joint Committee to:

- Increase data collection and analysis to gain better understanding of youth homelessness in Vermont.
- Develop a shared understanding of evidence-informed practices to address youth homelessness, current Vermont and national resources, and what interventions increase positive outcomes.
- Create a statewide plan to end youth homelessness through increasing capacity for interventions that reduce risk factors, build protective factors and mitigate long-term impacts of experiences of homelessness. Interventions should address four primary outcomes as outlined in the USICH framework¹:
 - Stable housing
 - Permanent connections
 - Education/ employment
 - Well-being
- Ensure that every community has the capacity to identify and engage youth at
 risk of experiencing homelessness and intervene to prevent loss, reduce barriers
 to emergency crisis services, and increase short and long term housing supports
 appropriate for the unique populations needs.

Emergency Cold Weather Shelter Partnership - Update - December 16, 2016

- The Vermont Agency of Human Services, Department for Children and Families supports approximately 500 emergency shelter beds and 250 transitional beds for Vermonters experiencing homeless. When these local programs are full, the Department augments this grant-funded capacity with motel vouchers through the General Assistance (GA) program. During colder weather, DCF relaxes some eligibility criteria for motel beds through a "cold weather exception to the GA rules."
- If <u>extremely cold</u> winter weather were to coincide with tourism events, such as a long holiday weekend,
 Vermont's largest communities could potentially run out of both shelter, transitional and motel beds,
 precipitating the need for additional mass shelter capacity, even in the absence of a presidential or
 gubernatorial-declared disaster.
- The AHS Secretary's Office has convened staff from multiple AHS departments, the Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and partners such as the American Red Cross and Community Action Agencies to develop a strategy for rapidly activating additional Emergency Cold Weather Shelter capacity in Vermont's larger communities. The current focus has been Chittenden and Rutland Counties.
- This planning represents a contingency that would only be activated for short periods during the coldest
 weather and only when other systems were overwhelmed. It will not replace current DCF-funded
 shelters, the use of motels, or the existing cold weather exception in the General Assistance program.
- On Thursday, December 8th, lead partners CVOEO and BROC ran simultaneous drills in Burlington and Rutland. The drill exercise also tested the VtAlert notification system that would be used to mobilize volunteers.
- 28 Trained volunteers from the Department of Health's Medical Reserve Corps and SerVermont's AmeriCorps program responded to both sites for the drill exercise, and received specialized training on facilities and procedures.
- The State and community partners were satisfied with the drill exercise and view this planning as an important contingency option to have available for a future winter weather emergency.
